Nicholas Chamberlaine School
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Under the Education Act 2002 (Section 175), schools must make arrangements to safeguard and promote the welfare of children. Parents/carers should know that the law (Children Act 1989) requires all school staff to pass on information which gives rise to a concern about a child's welfare, including risk from neglect, physical, emotional or sexual abuse. The staff will seek, in general, to discuss any concerns with the parent/carer and where possible seek their consent to a referral to social care. This will only be done where such discussion will not place the child at increased risk of significant harm. Schools will seek advice from Social Care when they have reasonable cause to suspect a child may be suffering or likely to suffer significant harm. Occasionally, concerns are passed on which are later shown to be unfounded. Parents/carers will appreciate that the designated person for child protection was carrying out their responsibilities in accordance with the law and acting in the best interests of the children.



Supporting each other

The Importance of Your Child's Form Group, House Group and Links with Home

Every student is a member of a Form and has a designated member of staff as their Form Tutor. Form Period is the very first place our students go to each day. The Form Tutor monitors academic progress, attitude to learning and personal and social development, as well as being the usual first contact with home for any matters regarding the daily events of academic school life. The Form Group encourages students to settle into school life quickly and easily, through clear routines and a sense of community identity.

Each Form Group belongs to one of our four House Groups: Livingstone, Cook, Kingsley and Drake. House assemblies are held fortnightly during the Form Period and will cover pastoral messages from Heads of House as well as advertising upcoming extra curricular opportunities, inter-House competitions and sharing successes. House identity and the community feeling it generates is a source of pride amongst our students.

The Heads of House form our pastoral system and create links with home in order to support the social and emotional

well-being of our students: the importance of strong support from home cannot be stated strongly enough as a means of ensuring our students perform to their very best abilities.

Inclusion and Special Educational Needs

We recognise and cater for a wide range of students' individual needs in learning, social and emotional difficulties and physical and sensory impairments. Liaison with key specialist agencies to support our students' needs is a crucial part of our role. Our Hub area provides a variety of support including literacy and numeracy for any student who needs additional help to reach their full potential.

Wide Horizons PSHCE and Religious Education Curriculum

Wide Horizons is the term used to describe the various means by which issues of Personal, Social, Health and Citizenship Education (PSHCE) are explored. All students will attend one Wide Horizons assembly per week, explore current moral and ethical issues in a fortnightly Wide Horizons debate in Form Period and also receive one hour of designated PSHCE teaching per fortnight.

The Wide Horizons curriculum explores Citizenship, Communities and Responsibilities (CCR), Sex and Relationships Education (SRE), Drugs and Risk Education (DRE), Personal Finance and Economic Wellbeing (PF&EW) and Emotional and Behavioural Wellbeing (EBW). Wide Horizons activities are often supported by visiting health professionals and other specialist services to ensure the content is relevant, accurate and contemporary.

As part of Wide Horizons, all students are encouraged to explore their own religious and moral beliefs as well as encouraging respect and tolerance for the beliefs of others. To this end, all students in Year 7 and Year 8 will receive designated religious education lessons where a range of cultural and religious beliefs are explored and compared, along with ethical and moral issues. In Year 9, all students will begin GCSE Religious Studies to continue this development. Students can extend this further with the option of studying A-level Philosophy and Ethics in the Sixth Form. The delivery of religious and ethical content is often supported by visiting representatives of various faith groups and the recognition of events of spiritual significance such as major world festivals.



Proud of our Community

A broad-based education is a preparation for modern life. We deliver the National Curriculum and ensure students' education is broad, balanced, differentiated and relevant. We are preparing students for their life in a rapidly changing society and our curriculum is designed with this in mind.

Students in Years 7 and 8 follow courses in Maths, English, Science, French, Technology, Religious Education, Physical Education, History, Geography, Art, Music, Information Technology and Drama.

In Years 9, 10 and 11 students have the opportunity to personalise their curriculum through an options process that extends their choice of subjects. Details of our Sixth Form curriculum is available in our separate Sixth Form Prospectus.

Each student is closely monitored in all subjects and, where necessary, there is individual support to accelerate progress and strengthen learning. We have a strong personal curriculum which teaches skills of personal excellence to help students achieve their targets and personal goals whilst developing each student as a world citizen.

We strive to involve all students in exciting and varied learning opportunities beyond the normal school day. We believe that learning can happen anywhere and anytime.

This means that we offer students opportunities to experience:

Sixth Form

Choosing the right Sixth Form is one of the most critical decisions that a student will make. At Nicholas Chamberlaine School we pride ourselves on offering a bespoke programme that will allow students to progress onto their first choice of university, career or apprenticeship.

Students entering the sixth form in Year 12 can choose from a range of vocational and academic courses, including the opportunity to undertake the Extended Project Qualification. Students also have the benefit of a comprehensive enrichment programme. In recent years, this has included first aid courses, acting as reading mentors, sports opportunities and work experience.

In Year 13, students continue with the subjects chosen in Year 12. In addition, they have the opportunity to undertake university visits, attend the UCAS Conference or visit the Skills Show in Birmingham. Year 13 students also have the opportunity to work with the school and wider community as Head Boy or Girl, members of the Student Union or as House Captains. All of these opportunities are designed to enhance both the academic skills and employability of our students.

Nicholas Chamberlaine Sixth Form prides itself on being a happy and inclusive environment. All our students are supported by a Form Tutor and members of the sixth Form team; they also have access to pastoral support. Our students have their own Sixth Form facilities and enjoy the privileges that being a Sixth Former brings.

Student Life

The defining principle of ‘Wide Horizons’ highlights our belief that learning occurs both within a classroom and beyond, through new experiences and opportunities. To this end, engaging with non-academic provision is an expectation for all students. Our non-academic provision is split into three categories:

1. Extra-Curricular Activities (ECA):
Voluntary clubs and societies for anything outside of the taught curriculum, held at least fortnightly. These are run by staff or Sixth Form students who have an interest or skill that others may share, have an interest in or want to try out. We currently hold approximately 70 ECA opportunities per week including Performing Arts Societies, sports teams and competitions, cookery, programming and debating. Students are also encouraged to start activities of their own, supported by staff.

2. More-Curricular Activities (MCA):
MCA are extra opportunities to reinforce or support the taught academic curriculum. This may be in the form of targeted intervention for specific individuals, additional classes run after the school day has finished or drop-down workshops dedicated to specific events.

Our MCA provision is flexible and responds to student need, aiming to provide opportunities for all students to realise their best potential in all academic fields.

3. Enrichment Activities (ENR):
ENR represents one-off learning opportunities, for example, school excursions, working within the community, visiting speakers and national competitions. Previous ENR activities have included a RADA production of *The Taming of the Shrew*, a skiing expedition to New York, a concert visit to the Royal Albert Hall, catering for and providing for a pensioners' banquet at The Almshouses, holding a Memorial Assembly with local regimental Standard Bearers amongst others.

Admissions Policy

The school admits up to 300 students in a year group. If there are more requests for places than there are places available, children will be accepted in the following order of priority:-

- Children in the priority area given in the area booklet who have a brother or sister at the school.
- Other children living in the priority area.
- Children living outside the priority area who have a brother or sister at the school.
- Other children living outside the priority area.

Within each category, decisions are based on the distance between home and school by the shortest walking route with priority going to those living nearest to the school. This applies equally to those living inside and outside the LA boundaries.

Parents seeking admission at other than normal age of transfer should contact the Admissions Service at Warwick County Education Office for advice.

Our Uniform

Compulsory

- Embroidered Charcoal Grey Blazer
- Burgundy and Gold Tie
- White collared shirt or blouse
- Loose-fitting tailored black trousers/knee length tailored skirt
- Black socks or black opaque tights when worn with skirts
- Black shoes (not boots or trainers) must be leather type, polishable, black and plain

Blazer and tie only available from the School's Uniform Supplier: Toye, Kenning and Spencer, Newtown Road, Bedworth.

Optional items only available from Toye, Kenning and Spencer

- Burgundy V-neck acrylic sweater
- Burgundy cardigan

Other items

- Coats must be plain black, navy blue or burgundy. No hoodies or logo-laden coats can be worn
- No denim is permitted
- Belts must be black, functional and worn to hold-up trousers i.e. not an accessory
- Bags must be large enough to hold an A4 file, stationery and P.E. kit

• Hats can only be worn outside of the school buildings and must be woollen and black in colour
